The National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV)'s <u>19th Annual Domestic Violence</u> <u>Counts Report</u> ("DV Counts") is instrumental in raising awareness about domestic violence and the work local domestic violence programs do every day, providing lifesaving services to survivors and their families.

DV Counts is an annual noninvasive, unduplicated count of adults and children who seek services from U.S. domestic violence shelter programs during a single 24-hour survey period. Conducted annually by NNEDV since 2006, DV Counts takes into account the dangerous nature of domestic violence by using a survey designed to protect the confidentiality and safety of victims.

Year after year, state, territorial, and local advocates, national experts, journalists and reporters, and policymakers rely on the report to understand the realities faced by advocates and survivors. **Thank** you for helping us bring attention to these stories.
