



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT

OREGON SUMMARY

On September 4, 2024, **33** out of **53 (62%)** identified domestic violence programs in Oregon participated in a national count of domestic violence services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). During the 24-hour survey period, participating programs served **1,913** victims, did not have enough resources to meet **1,259** requests for help, and shared the following additional information.

1,913 Victims Served

1,483 adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

430 adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, court accompaniment, counseling, and more.

614 Hotline Contacts Received

Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims in danger, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more. Programs' hotlines received **614** contacts, averaging **nearly 26** contacts per hour.

145 People Educated

Programs provided **7** educational sessions and trainings to **145** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention.

1,259 Unmet Requests for Services

Victims made **1,259** requests for services that programs could not provide because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **93%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.
