



# **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT** VERMONT SUMMARY

On September 4, 2024, **13** out of **13 (100%)** identified domestic violence programs in Vermont participated in a national count of domestic violence services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). During the 24-hour survey period, participating programs served **313** victims, did not have enough resources to meet **24** requests for help, and shared the following additional information.

#### **313 Victims Served**

**188** adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

**125** adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, court accompaniment, counseling, and more.

## **127 Hotline Contacts Received**

Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims in danger, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more. Programs' hotlines received **127** contacts, averaging **more than 5** contacts per hour.

### **36 People Educated**

Programs provided **2** educational sessions and trainings to **36** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention.

#### 24 Unmet Requests for Services

Victims made **24** requests for services that programs could not provide because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **58%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.
