

# GET PrEP'ED



PrEP (Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis) is a daily prescription medication, that can help reduce the risk of acquiring HIV through sex.

You must be HIV-negative before starting and while taking PrEP, therefore HIV testing prior to starting and every three months is conducted.

PrEP cannot prevent against other sexually transmitted infections (STIs); condom usage is still suggested every time you have sex.

When taken consistently, the risk of acquiring HIV through sex is reduced by about 99%.

The only two PrEP medications currently approved in the USA are Truvada and Descovy. Ask your doctor for more information.

If your partner has ever or is:

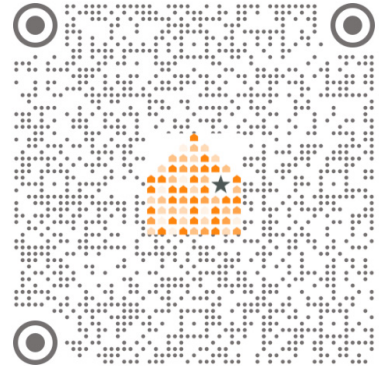
- Forcing sex
