



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT MISSOURI SUMMARY

On September 9, 2021, **51** out of **59** (**86%**) identified domestic violence programs in Missouri participated in a national count of domestic violence services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). In 2021, frontline advocates continued to navigate unforeseen challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other crises. The following figures represent the information shared by the participating programs about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

1,849 Victims Served in One Day

1,153 adult and child victims of domestic violence found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local domestic violence programs.

696 non-residential adult and child victims received supportive services including counseling, legal advocacy, and support groups.

392 Hotline Contacts Received

Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims in danger, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, and email. Hotline staff received **392** contacts, averaging more than **16** contacts per hour.

378 Unmet Requests for Services

Victims made **378** requests for services—including emergency shelter, housing, transportation, childcare, legal representation, and other support needs—that programs could not provide because they lacked the resources. Approximately **47%** of these unmet requests were for housing and emergency shelter.

There is a tremendous need for increased funding to ensure programs can provide comprehensive services to all survivors seeking help while working toward preventing violence in their communities.

**Affordable housing and transportation are the biggest barriers that survivors in our shelter face. Often, families are forced to remain in shelter for up to a year before any housing opportunities are available, and transportation limitations are a barrier to employment, education, and other resources that may help survivors rebuild their lives."
