



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORTOREGON SUMMARY

On September 6, 2023, **34** out of **54 (63%)** identified domestic violence programs in Oregon participated in a national count of domestic violence services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). The following figures were shared by participating programs about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

1,937 Victims Served

1,020 adult and child victims of domestic violence found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

917 adult and child victims received non-residential supportive services related to transportation, housing advocacy, legal support, therapy, and more.

454 Hotline Contacts Received

Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims in danger, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more. Programs' hotlines received **454** contacts, averaging **nearly 19** contacts per hour.

1,294 People Educated

Programs provided **5** educational sessions and trainings to **1,294** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention.

374 Unmet Requests for Services

Victims made **374** requests for services that programs could not provide because they lacked sufficient resources. Approximately **49%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.

**After years of abuse, one survivor faced language barriers, family and criminal court, and a protection order trial. We provided bilingual advocacy that made her feel like she finally had a support system and people who cared for her. We also provided housing advocacy, and she has now won her trial and transitioned into her new home with her kids. She thanked us for supporting her 'in every way possible.'" - Oregon advocate
