



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT ALASKA SUMMARY

On September 10, 2025, **24 out of 24 (100%)** identified domestic violence programs in Alaska participated in NNEDV’s Domestic Violence Counts Survey: a one-day, unduplicated count of adults and children seeking domestic violence services. Participating programs shared the following figures about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

637 Victims Served

473 adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

164 adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, housing support, legal support, therapy, and more.

173 Hotline Contacts Received

Programs’ hotlines received **173** contacts, averaging **more than 7** contacts per hour. Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more.

0 People Educated

While programs did not provide educational sessions during this period, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention are important throughout the year.

34 Unmet Requests for Services

Programs were unable to meet **34** requests for help because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **71%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.
