



# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT GUAM SUMMARY

On September 10, 2025, **4 out of 4 (100%)** identified domestic violence programs in Guam participated in NEDV's Domestic Violence Counts Survey: a one-day, unduplicated count of adults and children seeking domestic violence services. Participating programs shared the following figures about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

### 61 Victims Served

**45** adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

**16** adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, housing support, legal support, therapy, and more.

### 2 Hotline Contacts Received

Programs' hotlines received **2** contacts. Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more.

### 145 People Educated

Programs provided **2** educational sessions and trainings to **145** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention. Community education is essential to raising awareness and promoting resources.

### 46 Unmet Requests for Services

Programs were unable to meet **46** requests for help because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **98%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.

✘ "In Guam, housing is unaffordable, the minimum wage is low in comparison to the cost of living, and non-U.S. citizens, especially citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), have fewer resources and are on a separate housing waitlist. **FSM citizens are the second-highest ethnic group seeking domestic violence and sexual assault services in Guam.**" - *Guam advocate*
