



# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT NEW MEXICO SUMMARY

On September 10, 2025, **27 out of 30 (90%)** identified domestic violence programs in New Mexico participated in NNEDV’s Domestic Violence Counts Survey: a one-day, unduplicated count of adults and children seeking domestic violence services. Participating programs shared the following figures about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

### 771 Victims Served

**642** adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

**129** adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, housing support, legal support, therapy, and more.

### 248 Hotline Contacts Received

Programs’ hotlines received **248** contacts, averaging **more than 10** contacts per hour. Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more.

### 162 People Educated

Programs provided **9** educational sessions and trainings to **162** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention. Community education is essential to raising awareness and promoting resources.

### 108 Unmet Requests for Services

Programs were unable to meet **108** requests for help because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **46%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.

❖ **“Decreased funding, ongoing staff transitions, and a growing demand for services have created conditions where the need for support far exceeds current capacity.** Survivors are coming forward with increasingly complex needs that programs are struggling to meet.
