



# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT UTAH SUMMARY

On September 10, 2025, **14 out of 15 (93%)** identified domestic violence programs in Utah participated in NEDV's Domestic Violence Counts Survey: a one-day, unduplicated count of adults and children seeking domestic violence services. Participating programs shared the following figures about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

### 964 Victims Served

**616** adults and children found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local programs.

**348** adults and children received non-residential supportive services like transportation, housing support, legal support, therapy, and more.

### 381 Hotline Contacts Received

Programs' hotlines received **381** contacts, averaging **nearly 16** contacts per hour. Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, email, and more.

### 622 People Educated

Programs provided **22** educational sessions and trainings to **622** members of the public, addressing topics like domestic violence prevention and early intervention. Community education is essential to raising awareness and promoting resources.

### 217 Unmet Requests for Services

Programs were unable to meet **217** requests for help because they lacked sufficient resources, funding, and/or staffing. Approximately **33%** of these unmet requests were for emergency shelter, hotels, motels, transitional housing, and other housing.

❖ **"The reduction in federal funding has created a critical challenge for our programs.** We have prioritized protecting direct client services, core programs, and essential staff. However, this necessitated the near elimination of all financial support for clients, severely limiting our ability to offer comprehensive assistance. The complete loss of our prevention funding undercuts our ability to engage in crucial community outreach and education that reduces future incidents of violence." - *Utah advocate*
